Look Before You Lock Your Vehicles

Did you know that on a regular sunny day it can reach up to **110° Fahrenheit** inside your car? This can cause serious damage to the human body, especially infants and toddlers, if left inside the vehicle.



No amount of time is ok.

Here are some ways to prevent such a tragedy:

-Ask your childcare provider to call you if your child does not show up for childcare.



-Make a habit of looking in the vehicle, front and back, before locking the door and walking away.

-Placing your purse, briefcase or something else you need in the back seat so that you will have to check the back seat when you leave the vehicle.

ELC Programs and You

Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten (VPK)



VPK offers ALL 4-year-old children a jump start on reading, math, language, and social skills. In order for parents to register their child in the VPK program, you must obtain a certificate of eligibility (COE). School Readiness

School Readiness programs provide early education opportunities to children ages birth to 5 years old, particularly to children whose parents are economically disadvantaged; children who have been determined to be at risk of abuse, neglect or exploitation; and children with disabilities. Programs are extended up to 9 years old. Currently our enrollment is closed, but you may apply to the single-point-of-entry list by visiting <http://spe.schoolreadiness.org/pe/>.

Child Care Executive Partnership (CCEP) Program



The CCEP program offers financial assistance to low-income families through employer-supported child care. Parents pay a portion of their child care costs first (usually on a sliding fee scale based on family income). Then CCEP and the employer each pay 50 percent of the remaining balance. If you would like to participate in the CCEP ask your employer if your company is already a member of the program. If not, contact the Early Learning Coalition of Miami-Dade/Monroe and we

Enhance Your Child's Motor Skills

Enhance your little one's motor development skills as effectively at home as in school! Listed below are some age-appropriate activities in which you and your young child can actively participate together.

"Mirror, Mirror" (3-12 months) - Enhances visual discrimination and language skills

Stand in front of a mirror and hold your baby facing away from you so she can see her reflection. Sing and dance and point out her features--nose, tummy, feet, etc. Move away from the mirror's reflection and ask out loud, "Where are Mommy and Lucy?" Step back in front of the mirror and exclaim, "Here are Mommy and Lucy!" Encourage your baby to "interact" with her reflection.



"Simple Charades" (Preschool age) - Enhances visual discrimination and imagination

Play charades with your child and have him or her guess what you are pretending to do. For example, act out brushing your hair, putting on your shoes, or driving your car. Encourage your child to play-act for you so you can take turns guessing.
