These competencies reflect and define the content areas and knowledge expectations for those working in the early care and education profession. This document is the result of hard work by the Professional Development Initiative Steering Committee which is composed of early learning experts from across the state including providers, coalition directors, and representatives from partner agencies, higher learning institutions, and Head Start.

ELC Board of Directors

As seen in previous news alerts, we have featured our board members to familiarize our community with the dedicated professionals who serve on the Coalition's board of directors. In this issue, it is our pleasure to highlight Board Director **Valtena G. Brown**.



Ms. Valtena G. Brown is the assistant superintendent, curriculum, instruction for Miami-Dade County Public Schools. In this capacity, she is responsible for the development, coordination, and implementation of early childhood programs and the Ready Schools Miami initiative. Additionally, she oversees world languages and bilingual programs; instructional technology, instructional materials and library/media programs; career and technical education; summer services; and components diversity and compliance requirements.

Prior to her current appointment, Ms. Brown served as administrative director to the deputy superintendent, curriculum, instruction, and school improvement. In this capacity, she was responsible for the district coordination of Pre-K - 12 curriculum. This division coordinated multimillion dollar budgets and curricula for school reform, literacy, and parent involvement.

Ms. Brown also served as principal of Florida City Elementary School, an original SPARK school partner. Under her leadership and support, she forged multiple partnerships to

support transitions for children and families, from early childcare and pre-kindergarten programs to elementary schools. In addition, school readiness and high quality early learning became a focal point in aligning curriculum, instructional practices and professional development.

Ms. Brown holds a master's degree in community psychology as well as advanced certificates in education and educational leadership. She is a board member of the Early Learning Coalition of Miami-Dade/Monroe and has served as guest lecturer and presenter throughout Florida and the United States.

Team Member Spotlight

This month, the spotlight shines on another valued team member and the important work she accomplishes in bringing quality early childhood education to our community. In this issue, it is our pleasure to highlight **Mary Williams**, Managing Director of Monroe County.

In April of 2004, Mary Williams began her tenure as the program director for the formerly independent Monroe coalition. A short year later, the Monroe and Miami-Dade County coalitions merged into the Early Learning Coalition of Miami-Dade/Monroe and she was promoted to the position of managing director of Monroe County in July of 2006. In her role, Mary manages and oversees the day-to-day operations of Monroe's Coalition office. Her staff consists of a four-member team (Mary, an administrative assistant, and two classroom mentors).



Mary has taken an active role in facilitating a number of successful early care and education projects in the Monroe community. One of which, the Coalition's Monroe Classroom Mentoring program, first implemented in the spring of 2007, has increased the quality of providers' early education programs. Two mentors—one serving the Upper Keys and the other, the Lower Keys, work with teachers in classrooms spanning a 105-mile area, from Key West to Key Largo. Another is the five-year partnership with the Florida Keys Area Health Education Center to provide comprehensive health screenings and follow-up medical care annually to approximately 450 school readiness children in early education centers and family child care homes throughout Monroe County. The health-screening grant project has been instrumental in providing early detection and intervention necessary to ensure children's good health and development.

A longtime Keys resident, Mary has worked with diverse populations in the Monroe County community in social services, and workforce and education programs since 1986. She possesses a bachelor's degree in social work from the University of West Florida and a master's degree in educational leadership from the University of South Florida.

In her free time Mary enjoys walking along the beach or riding her bicycle around her residency of Old Town in Key West. She also enjoys reading, movies, and yoga. Mary has one daughter, a second-year medical resident at the University of Miami/Jackson Memorial Hospital.

As the primary liaison to the Coalition's providers in the Keys, Mary is often considered a lifeline to those she serves. The feeling and admiration is mutual, "I admire the dedication of our early education and care providers, who persevere in spite of the challenges of doing business in the Keys (extreme high cost of living, staff turnover, etc.) especially in these difficult economic times," Mary says.

REMINDER to All Providers Receiving School Readiness Funding

The 2009-2010 School Readiness Provider Agreement has been sent by certified mail to providers. **All providers who serve School Readiness children are required to complete and submit the agreement to the Coalition no later than July 1, 2009.**

Failure to submit an agreement by the July 1st deadline will affect your ability to provide and receive payment for School Readiness-funded services.

Providers, we need your help! **Please return your pending Ages & Stages Questionnaires (ASQs) as soon as possible.** If you need additional or updated age protocols please call (305) 270-2905 (south of Flagler Street) or (305) 953-6007 (north of Flagler Street).

Child Development Services (CDS) is responsible for implementation of the annual screening mandate. Please support them in this important undertaking.

Tips on completing your ASQ screenings:

- Please complete each ASQ within two weeks from the day received.
- Please have parents sign the yellow consent form.
- Complete the white and pink answer sheet entirely.

- Return the package to us in a self-addressed envelope.

Voluntary Prekindergarten (VPK) Updates

New Proposed VPK Advance Payment Rule

The Agency for Workforce Innovation (AWI) designed a new proposed VPK attendance rule. Below are highlights of the proposed Advance Payment rule.

- A provider must request the advance payment method.
- A provider who elects not to receive the advance will be paid for services rendered in accordance with the proposed VPK Uniform Attendance Rule.
- A provider who elects to receive the advance will receive 95% of the anticipated monthly payment as a monthly advance.
 - Why 95%? The proposal eliminates monthly reconciliation in order to fulfill coalitions' requests for VPK administrative efficiencies. Therefore AWI needs to ensure there are funds available at the end of the program with which to reconcile. Any money owed to providers will be reconciled in the final payment after the conclusion of the class instruction. At the same time, this proposal provides a consistent funding stream to providers so there is *no interruption in cash flow*.

The original draft proposal was shared with coalitions on April 29th and a workshop was held on May 8th. AWI received minimal coalition participation at the workshop which typically indicates that there are few or no concerns with the rule as presented. No providers attended the workshop. After the second release of the proposed rule draft in June, however, the Agency began to receive substantial input from providers regarding the impact of the proposed changes.

AWI has worked diligently and quickly to create a new proposal which addresses all concerns raised over the last several days. **To view the proposed rule, please visit the homepage of the Coalition's website at www.elcmdm.org.**

Quality Counts

The goal of **Quality Counts (QC)**, Miami-Dade County's voluntary quality-rating-improvement system, is to provide all children with the tools they need to become successful in school and in life. QC provides support to providers as they work to meet their goal of improving quality in the areas that affect young learners most: the learning environment, ratio of staff to child, professional development of teachers, parent involvement, and program administration.

QC reinforces the concept of parent choice, giving parents the necessary information to choose which early education program is the best fit for their child. Moreover, the program actively engages the entire child care community consisting of subsidized and non-subsidized early care and education programs, private and faith-based child care providers, family child care homes, Head Start/Early Head Start, Miami- Dade County Public Schools, and Redlands Christian Migrant Association (RCMA).

Those involved in the facilitation of QC have held many focus groups to find out what participants are thinking and how to improve processes and practices. Quality Counts strongly values the input of the provider community; their assistance and feedback continue to enhance the program and make it thrive. As a result, many programs have already engaged in a year of continuous quality improvement and are ready to receive a Star rating.
